What next for people fleeing Aleppo? Escaping the city doesn't mean escaping the war.

The months-long siege of eastern Aleppo ended this week as Syrian government forces wrested control of areas that had been held by rebel forces. The intensifying bombing in Aleppo in the weeks before the ceasefire forced many residents to shelter underground, and tens of thousands to flee. Those who remain behind have been living in fear of retribution: The United Nations reported this week that families were being shot in cold blood as their neighborhoods were retaken. The International Rescue Committee is very concerned that the violence will follow people as they flee the city.
